If the number of awards, activities and achievements by KET schools during the last term are anything to go by, then I look forward to hearing all about the schools' successes and accomplishments in the coming months.

Oakgrove Secondary began the academic year as the top performing school in Milton Keynes, following the publication of the Department for Education's national performance tables. Huge congratulations to the students and staff. Pupils at the primary had an extremely busy term, with participation in various environmental projects and a visit to MK Innovates, where pupils experienced a unique elevated view of Centre:MK on a Niftlylift raised platform.

The Sunday Times ranked Monkston Primary 65th in England and 13th in the region in the 'Parent Power' top primary school tables. The aggregated average scale scores from the 2019 SATs results were published in the guide in December. A fantastic end to the term for all at Monkston.

Kents Hill Park School were inspected by Ofsted in October and were delighted to receive the news that they were rated as 'Good' overall and 'Good' across all five categories. It was the first-ever full inspection at the school, since it opened in 2018, and is testament to James and his team.

Staff from Middleton Primary braved the cold during the Christmas break to attend a ceremony at The Old Bus Station, where they were presented with an award from the Deputy Mayor. The 'Bikeability School 2022' accolade was in recognition of Middleton's 246 trainee riders who have participated in the scheme.



Oakgrove School was officially ranked as the top performing school in Milton Keynes according to the national performance tables, released by the Department for Education in September. The data showed that Oakgrove achieved the highest GCSE Progress 8 and Attainment 8 scores.

The school's annual Young Musician of the Year competition was a huge success. There were two categories, one for Juniors (Grade 2-3) and one for Seniors (Grade 4+). Entrants included singers and musicians who impressed the audience with their talents by playing instruments such as the keyboard, flute and electric guitar. Every single participant did themselves and the school proud.

Research, that was conducted by English, Media and Film Studies Teacher, Mrs Chudasama and the Children's Research Centre, Faculty of Wellbeing, Education and Language Studies at the Open University, has now been published by Taylor and Francis Online. The article entitled "We can make our words powerful": students' perspectives about using Talk Factory, a classroom technology to support exploratory talk' features Oakgrove's pupils' views in the research. The article is free to access via Open University or from Mrs Chudasama.

A remarkable Year 12 pupil, who now lives in Milton Keynes as part of the Homes for Ukrainians scheme, joined Oakgrove's Sixth Form in September. Shortly after her arrival, she worked with a sponsor to establish a charity and in her role in communications she helps fellow Ukrainians, who want to find a safe place to stay and to apply for visas. For two hours a day, on average, and in addition to her studies, she and her sponsor help match Ukrainians with other potential sponsors.

Students from 11 Milton Keynes' schools were invited to hear from experts in Law about the many varied career opportunities available in the legal profession. Hosted jointly by Oakgrove and the University of Buckingham, the aim was to empower pupils from all backgrounds to realise their potential and to consider the different pathways in pursuing their ambitions in the Law industry.



At a worktree event in October, pupils had the opportunity to meet with professionals from a variety of occupations, some that they didn't even know existed. It helped pupils with their future aspirations, be it in work or further study.
